Indeed, outside of Him there is nothing, and whatever exists, exists by Christ's free gift of its being, so that one of the notions that is absolutely contradictory to the perfection of God is selfishness." —Thomas Merton

 \mathbf{p} y now you have certainly heard me say or write that we are

Dcalled to start with love and allow God to take care of the rest. It is a thread of so much over the past year especially. With all the judgment and resentment in our nation and in the world, it is becoming increasingly difficult to discern where the love can be found.

But we are godly people who start with love, because that is where God can be found. Start with love, then see what scripture has to say about it. Start with love and see what tradition has to say about it. Start with love and we can get our arms around every issue and ethical

situation that comes our way. During the pandemic, the decisions made in our human family aren't difficult to know if we start from love... only difficult in practice.

So, the question is, "What is the opposite of love?" I am finding everyday that it is not hate. What I am hearing from colleagues and bishops — and witnessing myself — is that the opposite of love is actually self-love. When we put the "self" at the center of the universe instead of God (who is the full perfect embodiment of love) we are no longer loving. This is what happened in the garden and this is what happened when the evil one fell from heaven. When it is all about me and my selfish desires, when I put my pride at the center, I lose my capacity to love.

Every human evil in the history of time has had its root in this selfishness. "Me and my..." is the most destructive force in universe.

But Jesus shows us another way. The way of love is unselfish

and sacrificial. There is a mutual sharing for the good of "us" for the welfare of others.

Bishop Curry talks about this with our money and the motto *e pluribus unum*, "out of many, one." The motto goes back to the Roman Republic. When each person loves other as much as himself, than *e plurbus unom* becomes possible. Love another as much as self or else democracy cannot stand.

In May comes the feast of the Visitation of Mary. Mary has a lot to teach us about selfless love. Mary was called by God to be the

Mother of Jesus, our Savior. At the same time, Mary also learned that her cousin, Elizabeth, had conceived a child in her advancing years. So, she goes on a difficult journey to see her cousin and share in their gifts and what amazing things God is doing for them and for the world.

It makes it more fitting that one of the lessons for the Visitation of Mary comes from Paul to the Romans.

"Let love be genuine; hate what is evil, hold fast to what is good; love one another with mutual affection; outdo one another in showing honor. Do not

lag in zeal, be ardent in spirit, serve the Lord. Rejoice in hope, be patient in suffering, persevere in prayer. Contribute to the needs of the saints; extend hospitality to strangers. Bless those who persecute you; bless and do not curse them. Rejoice with those who rejoice, weep with those who weep. Live in harmony with one another; do not be haughty, but associate with the lowly."—Romans 12:9-16

My prayer for St. Paul's as we open our doors and get things moving is to follow Mary. Share Jesus with the world. Go out of your way for others. Rejoice in the good news of God in Christ. Be mindful of our selfish desires that keep bubbling up. Be aware of the moments where I know I am thinking of "me" instead of "we." Thanks be to God that we are surrounded by a great cloud of witnesses in our parish family who help remind me again and again.

The Meridian Freedom Project

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is another in our series of articles highlighting the organizations supported by St. Paul's Outreach Ministry.)

In December 2020 St. Paul's contributed \$1,000 from our Outreach Budget to The Meridian Freedom ⚠ Project. The mission of The Meridian Freedom Project is to create a corps of academically capable, socially conscious and mentally disciplined young leaders in Meridian. They are committed to LEADership, believing that education is the seed of freedom.

In 2012, concerned community members in Meridian were looking for new programs that could offer opportunities to local students. When searching for a project to complete her commitment to Parents for Public Schools, Amy Elliott was directed to the Sunflower County Freedom Project. What made the Sunflower Program successful and compelling was its culture of student leadership and achievement and its very strong links to Teach for America. Back in Meridian, Amy formed a partnership with Dr. William F. Scaggs, President Emeritus of Meridian Community College, and Flo Bradley, CEO of FloBradley.com, to create a new Meridian Freedom Project.


The three co-founders took their message to the businesses and organizations in the Meridian area. With the support of Parents for Public School, The Montgomery Institute, The Phil Hardin Foundation, and AT&T, Amy, Dr. Scaggs and Flo worked with the founders in Sunflower to create the Freedom Project Network, and agreement that would recognize Meridian as the first affiliate and expansion site of the Sunflower County Freedom Project.

Following two years of planning and the generous support and partnership of the MCC, The Montgomery Institute, the Meridian and Sunflower leadership, the Meridian Freedom Project opened its doors in June 2014 with their inaugural Freedom Summer for 30 Meridian Public School students, grades 6-8.

As they enter their seventh year of operation and sixth year of programming, they have named Adrian Cross as Executive Director, and have expanded their reach to serve students in this community in grades 6-12. They also serve students from Lauderdale County, representing Southeast schools, Northeast schools and West Lauderdale.

The Achievement Gap is an opportunity gap, and it is real in Meridian. According to the Mississippi Department of Education for Meridian Public Schools' class of 2014: the graduation rate was 62.5% and the drop out rate was 25.9%. The Meridian Public School District is making incredible progress with Meridian students and they are fortunate to have such a strong partnership with their leader. The MFP expands the hard work of the teachers, parents and administrators to after school, Saturdays, and summer, helping ensure the students return to school each day focused, ready and prepared to learn. They believe to change the reality for their students, it takes our community partnering with the schools. Partnerships with the parents of the students is also an important part of their process, offering support and coaching as needed so they can in turn support their children.


Cate Simmons
