"For These Eyes of Mine Have Seen the Savior..."

↑ s we move through the season of Epiphany and approach Awhat our office calls "administrative season," we enter into a time of deep significance in the life of the Church and the broader journey of faith.

Part of this season is anticipating 40 days after the birth of Christ, when Mary and Joseph bring their baby to the Temple in Jerusalem, as prescribed by the Law of Moses. This event is known as "the Presentation" (or Candlemas) is always celebrated in Christianity on February 2 (also Groundhog Day). This event, found in the Gospel of Luke, reveals the fulfillment of ancient prophecies and the recognition of Jesus as the Light of the World.

As the story goes, the elderly Simeon and the prophet Anna recognize the Christ child as the promised Savior. Simeon's words, now known as the *Nunc Dimittis*, that Episcopalians pray at Evening Prayer as part of the Daily Office, proclaim, "Lord, you now have set your servant free to go in peace as you have promised; For these eyes of mine have seen the Savior, whom you have prepared for all the world to see." (Luke 2:29-31) Simeon's blessing of the child is special because he has waited his entire life with the hope that he would witness Christ's presence before he dies. Anna, a widow and prophet, also gives thanks to God and speaks about the child to people.

The Presentation is not only a moment of fulfillment but also of revelation. In the Temple, Jesus is presented as the light for the Gentiles and the glory of Israel, which echoes the ancient prophecy in Isaiah that we pray during the season of Epiphany; "I will give you as a light to the nations, that my salvation may reach to the end of the earth". (Isaiah 49:6) Jesus is the Light who illumines our lives, guides us toward truth, justice, and peace. This light calls us to share in the work of revelation and transformation and reflect this light in the world today.

For St. Paul's, the weeks following Christmas and the symbolic burning of the greens at Epiphany, are days to assess our collective mission. We gather our annual report (please give yours to Joane, our administrator as soon as you write them). We discern the health and vitality of our

ministries. We review our plans and goals and form our budget, At the end of January, we will convene for our annual meeting and will gather among the diocese for annual council. After these things, we will have a vestry retreat before preparing for the season of Lent.

This administrative season, though practical in nature, is no less sacred than the story of the Presentation. It is an opportunity for us to pause, reflect, and evaluate how we, as the Body of Christ, are living out our call to be a light in the world. I am discovering more and more every day that my "job," is to call the Church to be the Church — to participate in God's redeeming love in our city. At the church's best, it is a partnership between all of us to carrying out this work together.

Just as Simeon and Anna were expectantly waiting and looking for God's promise to be fulfilled, we too are called to assess how well we are responding to God's call in the life of our church. We take stock of how we are living out our calling as the body of Christ, individually and together. I wonder how we fulfill the mission of Christ. I wonder how we share the light of Christ with our neighbors and the world; how we support one another in our common life and ministry.

The Presentation of Jesus in the Temple is not just a historical event; it is a call to each of us to renew our faith, to deepen our commitment, and to shine the light of Christ in every corner of our lives.

Thank you for putting commitment into action with your pledge. Next is to imagine how we can live out this mission in 2025. Whether you are an active volunteer, a member of a ministry team, or someone who supports the church through prayer and presence, your participation is vital.

As we prepare for the journey ahead, we give thanks for the ministries and services that continue to bless our church family. We support our leadership, both lay and ordained, as they guide us in our shared mission. Together, we will continue to be the people who, like Simeon and Anna, joyfully recognize Christ's presence among us and share that light with the world.

Vestry Nominations Open

N Tominations are open to elect three new members of the Vestry to serve **1** In three-year terms. Forms for nominations are available at the entrances to Nave and on the bulletin board in the hallway and will be accepted until January 20.

A potential vestry member must be a confirmed communicant, at least 21 years of age, must be canonically resident and actually residing in the parish (letter of membership on file); must be entitled to suffrage at annual meeting at which elected; cannot have served on the Vestry in previous three years (though such person is immediately eligible to stand for nomination as Warden); and shall not serve more than six consecutive years in that or a combination of vestry member/warden offices unless said individual has served a portion of a former term (i.e. filled an unexpired term).

Prior to the Annual Parish Meeting, potential Vestry members will meet with the Rector; consent to the parish's Vestry Covenant; and commit to attend the Annual Vestry retreat, which is scheduled for February 22.
