The Son of David Stops

"But Jesus heard him through the crowd and stopped."—Mark 10:49

As many of you know clergy just convened for our annual clergy conference in Tupelo. Now I always look forward to this time with colleagues, but this year's conference was especially unique as we welcomed the vision and hopes for healing and the mission of the church with our new bishop. I invite you to read her letter sent out after she sent us out into the world.

I also have been thinking a great deal about walking with Jesus through the lens of Mark over the past year. We are coming to the end of this year in our Lectionary and often consider the story of each Sunday, but not the big picture of the whole Gospel.

One thing that makes Mark special for me — and I'm not sure if I've said it much in the pulpit — is how Jesus, like the Holy Spirit, is always on the move. From the very beginning, from being baptized in the River Jordan and throughout his ministry in the world, we hear words like "immediately, passed, went" and "as soon as." Even the story of Easter is open ended, as we hear the news that "he has already gone ahead of you to Galilee."

This is important because so often we try to picture the face of Jesus. But following Jesus in Mark, along with the disciples, we can't keep up. As soon as the disciples catch up with all the healing and teaching, Jesus is already on to the next place... the next opportunity to act in teaching us what it means to do justice, love mercy and walk humbly with our God. I imagine, when I read Mark, that I do not see the face of Jesus but his back.

So it is a big deal when Jesus stops in Mark. Somebody must really be calling his attention to pull away from all he is trying to do in such a short amount of time. And that is what happens with Bartimaeus, the beggar who is blind. "Son of David, have mercy on me!" Not only does Jesus hear the plea of Bartimaeus through the crowd, he stops. Why?

Jesus can show mercy to him and healing to him. Everyone else had given up on him and believed him to be punished because of his blindness. But this wouldn't make Jesus stop.

Jesus stops because he hears someone call him "Son of David." He stops, because up to this point, he has made the effort to keep his identity a secret. But now his path is towards Jerusalem and to his death. He doesn't need to keep the secret anymore. In fact, if you ever see a lion with a long tail in Medieval tapestries or art, it depicts Jesus in Mark, it depicts Jesus sweeping the footprints behind him.

All this makes me wonder what it might take for Christ to stop for us. Yes, we all plead for the mercy of God all the time. As I write this, I consider the season of a presidential election and all the toxicity on every side. Pleading for mercy these days is right and good to do.

But how often to we name the identity of our God so that Christ stops for a second? Son of David... the one who will redeem Israel... the one who promises to be alongside us through anything... the one who loves me exactly as I am... have mercy on me.

And then, how often does the church make the world stop? Do we name for the world our Messiah — the hope of God's people revealed through Christ?

In what ways might the church speak to "God is love" in ways where the world stops and takes notice? These are questions worth pondering for the Body of Christ.

Father Austin and I left Tupelo energized and hopeful. The Mississippi Episcopal branch of the Jesus Movement has plenty of good work ahead of us. Another thing to note is how inspiring it was to see how many clergy in Mississippi came out of Meridian or served here at some point. It reminded me that this is a special place where God is still at work among us.

We look forward to this new season in our Diocese as we journey together to make God's love known and felt to our state.
