For as the earth brings forth its shoots, and as a garden causes what is sown in it to spring up, so the Lord God will cause righteousness and praise to spring up before all the nations." -Isaiah 61:11

ne of the lasting "Good Friday" images actually came Uthe day after Christmas.

When I attended seminary in Manhattan, it was wonderful

to be in New York for the Christmas season, at least the secular shopping part. It was also fun to buy a small, way overpriced tree and put it in our studio apartment on "The Close" (cloister). December 26 though, was a different story. Countless trees were stacked along the streets waiting to be picked up, while Anglicans somehow tried to hold those 12 days. Those trees brought so much joy, now they were waiting to be hauled

Stepping into the nave as our carpet was taken up felt the same way to me. This old carpet was stacked like those trees, after it had brought so much joy

for so long to so many yet now it was ready to be picked up and hauled away. The end of an age, so to speak and reflective of so many emotions in the life of the church in these days. We are getting ready to come back, some of us coming back to a nave with our restored wooden floors, while some of us are getting into the habit of returning to church. Please consider this an invitation if this applies to

It is only fitting, then, that the Feast of the Virgin Mary falls in the middle of August. The day celebrates the grace and power of God in a human life, and in the church; what extraordinary and truly marvelous things God can do when we are receptive to God's call.

The carpet was laid in the 1960s. This has been confirmed by Sally Neville who sang in the children's choir the first

Sunday the carpet was in place. She remembered the day because she got sick on all the brand new red carpet. Sixty years is comparable to saying "Well done, good and faithful servant."

Faith and trust — Mary's total faith in her Lord and Saviour. Faith and trust that we will breathe anew in our worship space, that it will be spirit filled. Faith and trust

> that we can let go of some things and haul them off with the carpet. Faith and trust that letting go of these things we may find new ways to serve, love, and make our hearts sing.

Some might say that Mary was nothing more than a woman who simply happened to be chosen as the Mother of Jesus. I hope if this is the case, the church may find ways to let go of that feeling like old carpet.

Mary is the first to say yes to God's call, "The Mother of the Church," and "full of grace," Mary is the model of Christian discipleship. At Cana at Galilee, she told the waiters, "Whatever He says, do it."

She found total freedom from always trying control everything and everyone, and let it be and let God, all the way to witnessing her Beloved son cross.

St. Paul's is stirring up too. Someone has already said of the floor "I love to think of all the people that have walked on these floors before us." As we come back to our worship space and back to formation, we are the ones who walk on those floors, we are this generation of God's own in the world. The shoots of grace are sprouting up. God needs the Church to be like Mary, willing to let go of "old carpets" and see where the Spirit moves in God's church. God longs for us to say "let it be" to the next chapter, and open to haul off whatever needs to go.

### **Fifteenth Lambeth Conference Convenes**

Late July and early August, bishops from all around the Anglican Communion Lwill convene for the Lambeth Conference for prayer and reflection, fellowship and dialogue on church and world affairs. The conference takes place around every ten years since 1867 and takes place at the University of Kent, Canterbury Cathedral, and Lambeth Palace in the UK.

With the theme of "God's Church for God's World - walking, listening and witnessing together," the conference will explore what it means for the Anglican Communion to be responsive to the needs of a 21st Century world. Below is part of a message for attendees, written by the Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby.

"As you prepare your hearts and minds for this gathering, I pray that we all reflect on the draft Call on Anglican Identity, which states that Anglicans "belong to a tradition that seeks faithfulness to God in richly diverse cultures, distinct human experiences, and deep disagreements." That call also states: "The Anglican Communion is a gift from God. Governed by Scripture, affirming the ancient creeds, sacramentally centered and episcopally led — Anglicans seek to be faithful to God in their agreement and in their disagreements."

Without ignoring those things on which we deeply disagree, I pray that we will approach this gathering with an even deeper sense of what unites us: the love of Jesus Christ and his calling to serve God's world."

This is a good reminder for Anglicans always and everywhere.
